George Laverne Smith was born on October 25, 1934, in Berrien Springs, Michigan, to Lynn and Hazel (Urick) Smith. To this union, George and Jackie had five children. George loved South Dakota, the hunting and fishing it provided and the people of the State. Most of his acquaintances knew of the commitment he had to the Milbank School District and the Milbank community.
